PRINCIPAL ANNUAL REPORT 2023

2023 marked a year of significant global shifts and milestones. As the world grappled with over 38 conflicts, including Russia's invasion of Ukraine and the Gaza battle, headlines were dominated by turmoil. Amidst these events, notable celebrations such as the centenaries of Disney and Warner Brothers, alongside the coronation of King Charles, captured international attention.
